April Masini is an advice columnist, owner of askapril.com and author of “Date Out Of Your League.” She wouldn’t tell me her age because, “you never ask a woman her age.” Masini’s mother is 65, so do the math. She’s lived in New York, Los Angeles, Georgia and Europe. She now splits times between being on the road and her home at Mediterra, a gated community near the Lee/Collier county border along Livingston Road. A self-admitted “college dropout,” Masini studied business at Hofstra University in New York before starting a career in modeling and television.

I’m an Army brat. I was born in Fort Bragg, N.C. We moved from Fort Bragg over to Europe, lived in Amsterdam, and then we went down to Miami, and then Georgia. My parents owned a school for retarded children in Clarksville (Georgia), so I grew up with about a hundred retarded brothers and sisters.

When I was living in Georgia, there was a big house, the biggest house in Georgia. It was this place called the Charm House. It used to be a Civil War hospital that they converted and made into a restaurant. It sat on this big corner and when I was 12, I told my mom that I had to go into that house. I wanted to live in that house. So I went up to their door one day and convinced them that they should have tours of the upstairs where the hospital was and I would be their tour guide. So I got to work in

that house. I’ve always been someone who, once I set down a path to do something, I’m going to do it. One way or another.

I packed up my car one day when I was in college, and I said to my mom, “Enough with school.” And I moved to New York and waited tables and that led to modeling and modeling led to acting and acting led to my ex-husband (television producer Al Masini) and that led to television and film and writing and producing.

He asked me to model on “Star Search,” and I said, “I’m interested in modeling but if you let me run your company, then we can talk.” I was president of Al Masini Productions for 12 years.

I studied business and marketing and merchandising. I moved to New York City, and my mother about had a heart attack. She writes books and has a PhD. With that kind of background, the last thing you want to her from your kid is they’re dropping out of college.

I write and create shows. I probably have 20 television shows I’m working on. I’m in the middle of pitching some of them right now in Los Angeles. It’s addictive: Taking a germ of an idea and creating it and nurturing it. Going from an idea and making it a pilot and making the pilot
